### A Checklist for Catholic Dads

### Surrender

We have to surrender on an ongoing basis to Christ for his will to be done in our lives. Guys, we are not in charge ... as much as we want to be! St. Ignatius of Loyola once said: "Few souls understand what God would accomplish in them if they were to abandon themselves unreservedly to him and if they were to allow his grace to mold them accordingly."

### Be a Man of Prayer

Our children will be much more likely to pray if we do. Work on developing a daily prayer routine with the goal of at least an hour a day devoted to prayer. Sound difficult? Think about how much TV we watch a day or answering email. Consider how much time we spend in our cars each day and how much time we devote to exercise. We have more than enough time

for prayer if we schedule it and integrate it into our day. Also, imagine the powerful influence we can have on our children if they see us on our knees in prayer each night at family prayer time.

#### **Understand Our True Vocation**

For those of us blessed to be married and have children, we must recognize that helping our families get to heaven and being good husbands and fathers—not our business careers—is our real vocation. Ask yourself: "Is my work serving my family? Or is my family serving my work?"

#### **Invest Time**

Our children need our time. Put down the smartphone; turn off the TV; cancel the golf outing. Let's spend more time with our kids! In the absence of a father's time with his family, you can bet there are countless bad influences ready to take his place and guide his children in the wrong direction. I paraphrase author-theologian Scott Hahn, who wrote that in our modern age the father or mother who is willing to walk out of the office after forty hours in order to have more time with his/her family is the real hero.

### Be Courageous

Christians are meant to stand out, not blend in. Blending in speaks to conforming so that our faith becomes part of the mainstream ... and we need to fight the culture. These are difficult times, and we have a responsibility to love and defend Christ, be great role models for our families and stand up for our faith.

#### **Practice Detachment**

Are we too focused on acquiring toys, bigger houses, nicer cars or the next promotion? We need to let go of the things that are in the way of our prayer lives, Mass attendance, charitable giving, volunteering, time with our families and certainly our relationships with Christ.

### Love, Our Wives

Husbands, we must love and cherish our wives, plain and simple. Our children will learn to love others by how they see Mum and Dad love each other. We need to say, "I love you" to our wives and our children as often as possible. Let's show our wives respect and cherish the critical role they play in our families. "The most important thing a father can do for his children is to love their mother." So said Theodore Hesburgh.

Today's kids face significant challenges and strong fathers, without a doubt, are part of the solution.

Let's take a few minutes to reflect on how we are doing as fathers and as husbands. Take the results of this reflection to prayer and reconciliation. Most importantly, commit to make the necessary changes.

As Catholic men, we have a responsibility to be strong fathers and husbands, leaders in our parishes, good stewards in our communities and humble followers of Christ.

Let's look to the inspiring example of St. Joseph, patron saint of fathers, workers and the universal Church, for his obedience, humility, selflessness, courage and the love he showed to Mary and Jesus. If we can emulate St. Joseph even a little each day,

we will be that much closer to becoming the men and fathers we are called to be.

# **Deputy Principal Learning and Teachng**

As the term draws closer to its end I thought it might be a timely reminder to revisit some of our College policies and processes.

### **Homework Policy**

At Catholic Regional College Caroline Springs, we believe homework should be a meaningful and worthwhile experience for students and is most effective in supporting learning when it has a clear purpose. As part of a comprehensive and balanced curriculum within Victorian schools, homework is seen as one way of supporting and fostering life-long learning and connecting families with the learning of their children.

We encourage you to familiarise yourself with our *Homework Policy* together with your child. Please find a copy of the *Catholic Regional College Homework Policy*.

### Homework catch-up

Homework catch-up is designed to assist student completion of homework. It is for students who would benefit from a quiet environment to work on a task, as well as students who have been placed on Homework catch-up as a means to address non-submission or completion of homework.

Where a student fails to complete set homework the parents/ carers are informed of this via SEQTA generated emails. Where this is a common occurrence, subject teachers will contact parents/carers by phone to discuss the issue.

Homework catch-up will take place in Room MM2 every Tuesday and Thursday lunchtime from 1:00pm to 1:30pm.

#### Non-attendance

If a student does not attend a Homework catch-up session, parents/carers will be contacted by the subject teacher to follow up the curriculum concern and a Thursday After School Recall session will be issued by a Year Level Leader for the following Thursday via Thursday Recall Notification on SEQTA.

### **Extra Support**

Maths support will run twice a week after school. In 2019 these sessions will take place in Room MM2 every Monday and Wednesday from 3:20pm until 4:15pm.

Where a parent/carer is concerned that a student is overwhelmed with homework requirements, they are advised to contact the subject teacher setting the homework.

### **Academic Integrity**

As members of the community at Catholic Regional College Caroline Springs, we value academic integrity in all aspects of our work. Respect for one's own academic work as well as respect for others' work, is a vital part of integrity. For such reasons, we acknowledge others' contributions and efforts in our work.

We would encourage our parents/carers to familiarise themselves with our *Code of Academic Integrity* and discuss this with your son/daughter.

When a breach of academic integrity is identified students will receive a resubmission date for their work. As a result of the breach in academic integrity the student will receive a 'zero' for the task. Parents/carers will receive a notification via SEQTA regarding the nature of the breach. The overall semester result will therefore be impacted.

#### As a parent/carer you may support your child by

- developing a positive approach to homework
- ensuring there is a balance between the time spent on homework and recreational activities
- talking to teachers about any concerns they have about the homework
- attending the school events, productions or displays their child is involved in
- discussing homework with their child in their first language, if English is not the main language spoken at home, and linking it to previous experiences
- linking homework and other learning activities to the families' culture, history and language, linking with relevant services, clubs, associations and community groups.

### Catholic Regional College Caroline Springs Assessment Re-Sit Procedure 2019

With the introduction of VCE Units 1&2 Psychology and Health & Human Development, the College is required to have a designated time allocated for the re-sitting of School Assessed Coursework (SAC). This time for re-sitting assessment tasks would be made available to all students across the College.

A 100-minute assessment re-sit period will take place at the College each Day 9 from 3:20pm - 5:00pm in the College Cafeteria. This re-sit period is supervised by College teaching staff to allow for any student who has missed an in-class assessment without the need to be absent for additional class time. Students scheduled to attend the re-sit period will be required to be present for the entire 100-minutes regardless of the length of time required to complete the assessment task assigned by the classroom teacher. Students will be able to complete private study within any remaining time.

If your child is required to attend an after-school assessment re-sit, you will be notified of this through SEQTA, by no later than 3:30pm on the Tuesday prior to the scheduled Thursday assessment re-sit.

If a student is absent from an assessment re-sit, the student will receive a score of 0% for the assessment task.

# **NAPLAN 2019 Student Reports**

In May of this year, national literacy and numeracy assessments were administered online to our Year 7 and Year 9 students. NAPLAN results are now available to parents and will enable us to see how students are progressing, not just within their class, but also against national standards that have been agreed upon by all state and territory governments.

Results for Year 7 are reported across the range of Band 4 to Band 9, with Band 5 representing the national minimum standard for this year level.

Results for Year 9 are reported across the range of Band 5 to Band 10, with Band 6 representing the national minimum standard for this year level.

If you are the parent/carer of a student in Years 7 or 9 you will receive an individual report of your child's results for the tests they sat in May. Included with your child's report will be information about:

- How do I read the report?
- How does NAPLAN help my child?
- What impact will the results have on my child's future?
- How does NAPLAN help my school?

- Who else will see the results?
- What if the results are not what my child and I expected?

### Drop off and Pick up zone

After extensive consultation with the Melton City Council, in order to ensure the safety of our student's, beginning in Term 4 the parking area at the front of the college on College Street, will become a Drop off and Pick up zone during the following hours:

# School Days: 8:00am to 9:30am and 2:30 – 4.00pm Safety tips for drivers using a Drop-off and Pick-up zones

- Always drop off or pick up your child from the designated zone and follow the school's procedures
- Drivers should remain in their vehicles at all times in the Drop-off and Pick-up zone
- Make sure children use the Safety Door (the rear footpath side door) to get in and out of the car
- Make sure the handbrake is applied when the vehicle is stationery
- Always park legally
- Avoid dangerous manoeuvers such as U-turns and three-point turns.

### Safety tips for students

- Always get in and out of the vehicle through the Safety Door, the rear footpath-side door
- Stay buckled up until the vehicle has stopped in the Drop-off and pick-up area
- Make sure your school bag and other items are in a safe position, such as on the floor
- Be ready to get out of the vehicle with your belongings when the car has stopped and you have unbuckled your seatbelt.

# Uganda Project: Purpose and Meaning of \$25

There's a reason why you're reading this. You are part of the Catholic Regional College Caroline Springs community. Of all the choices that you could have picked, you chose to send your child to our College. Whether or not you yourself received a Catholic education, you must have considered the values that are taught and promoted before sending your child to be educated by us. And you must have been attracted to the fact that as a Catholic college, we not only aim to develop your child as a capable learner but also a sincerely empathetic global citizen.

18 months ago, CRCCS started the **Uganda Project** headed by our Deputy Principal Wellbeing, Ric Brodrick, who has established a close friendship with the community of St. Francis School, Kizinga in the district of Rakai, Southern Uganda. Although St. Francis is impoverished, they are a resilient community. They share the very same unconditional love for their children as you do for yours. Their aim in life is simple; feed the children and make sure their lives are headed towards a brighter path through a meaningful education. Alas, due to their economic circumstance, these two goals are exceptionally difficult to achieve which is why we as a Catholic college are committed to fulfilling our social responsibility to do what we can to help St. Francis achieve their goal.

It is well known that before we can help others, we must take care of ourselves and our loved ones. This is no easy task. It takes a strong will and plenty of sacrifices to create a secure and happy environment for ourselves and our family. Only after we have achieved this security can we actually begin to intrinsically strive for more purpose and meaning in our lives.

This is the very purpose and meaning that drives our College's request for a charitable donation of \$25 dollars from each student. This is no easy request and this decision was critically analysed before it was approved. This request was only made possible due to the overwhelming mentality and support of our students' belief in a more just and equitable world, especially for those who are at a greater disadvantage.

The \$25 dollars your child donates will hopefully accumulate to \$20,000 dollars. Additionally, more classrooms and buildings will be created to make the learning environment for St. Francis more effective and comfortable for their students.

As such, these funds will generate a sustainable environment with a focus on health, happiness and education; the very environment that your children enjoy in our college.

While \$25 dollars is a fair sum to donate, it is a worthy sacrifice to make. It is a sacrifice filled with purpose and meaning. Our students, your children, believe in this cause. We hope that you can support them in their belief of a better world.

#### Loans
