Coronavirus

Our first priority at Catholic Regional College Caroline Springs is the health and safety of our school community.

I want to reassure you that the school is well-prepared for the impact of COVID-19 (coronavirus).

We are being provided the latest advice from the Australian and Victorian Chief Medical Officers by the Catholic Education Commission of Victoria Ltd to ensure that our school practices are helping to keep our community safe from the outbreak.

Any incidents that arise will be addressed in accordance with our Critical Incident and Emergency Management Plan. We will also have access to resources and support from Catholic Education Melbourne and the Department of Health and Human Services.

As parents, you have a critical role in helping the school manage this situation:

- Exercise good judgment by keeping children home if they are feeling unwell for any reason
- Talk to children about the situation, as they may be feeling anxious or stressed. You have a key role in helping students feel prepared and safe
- Encourage children to be proactive and committed to their schoolwork, and to stay connected with the school and their teachers
- Ensure children are vigilant with their personal hygiene.

As you may be aware, Victoria's Chief Health Officer recently issued updated advice that overseas school excursions should cease, except to New Zealand and Canada. As a result of this directive, we have made the decision to cancel the following international trips planned for 2020:

- NASA/STEM Florida, USA trip
- Italy tour
- Kokoda Trek

This decision has been made in the best interests of the safety of all travellers. We have commenced seeking potential refund options from all external providers, which will continue over the coming days.

Although, many may think that this is an improvement from preachy 'fire and brimstone' it has actually had a effect on our spiritual growth. I am often astounded by how many Catholics state that they do not believe that the devil exists. The saying "the better the devil you know, than the devil you don't" rings true in this instance. How are we able to recognise evil if we believe that evil does not exist? Many would be surprised how many times Pope Francis has mentioned the devil since becoming pope in 2013.

In Francis' recent Sunday Angelus he warned the faithful to 'never engage in dialogue with the devil.'

Pope Francis said Satan breaks into people's lives to tempt them with his enticing proposals. The devil, he said, "mixes his own voice with the many other voices that try to tame our conscience," and he warned believers to be aware that "messages come at us from many places enticing us to experience the intoxication of transgression".


However, all of this is illusory, he said, and "very quickly, we realize that the more we distance ourselves from God, the more defenceless and helpless we feel when facing the large existential problems".

The Pope concluded his catechesis by appealing for the intercession of the mother of "He who crushed the head of the serpent," to help us, during this time of Lent, "to be vigilant when confronted with temptation, and not to submit ourselves to any idol whatsoever of this world, and to follow Jesus in the battle against evil".

NAPLAN Online

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) for Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 students is held in May each year. NAPLAN tests assess student knowledge and skills in Writing, Reading, Conventions of Language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and Numeracy. The results of the tests provide information for students, parents, teachers and principals which can be used to improve student achievement.

In 2018, the NAPLAN tests began transitioning from a paper based test to an online assessment (i.e., students complete the tests utilising a computer). It is anticipated that from 2021, all schools in Australia will deliver the tests online. NAPLAN Online delivers numerous benefits including:

- a 'tailored test' design that adapts to correct and incorrect student responses providing a more precise understanding of student achievement;
- innovative use of technology, including a more engaging test design and a wider range of item types;
- the extension of the 'test window' to two weeks, allowing schools greater opportunity to schedule the tests at times that suit them best and increasing student participation.

Catholic Regional College Caroline Springs transitioned to NAPLAN Online in 2019, and will once again facilitate NAPLAN Online in 2020. In preparation for the testing, all schools are required to complete a Coordinated Practice Test (CPT) on Monday 23rd March (Week 8). The CPT will involve all Year 7 and Year 9 students.

The CPT provides schools and students an opportunity to:

- become familiar with question types contained in the NAPLAN Online tests
- assess readiness to participate in NAPLAN Online
- have students engage with and prepare for the online assessments
- trial new processes for administering tests online
- retain ongoing access to an online training environment

Support can be arranged for students with diverse learning needs, if the student regularly uses similar support for classroom assessment tasks.

It is important to remember that the CPT is **not** a **formal** assessment and students will not be graded for any of the **tests.** However, student participation will assist in confirming readiness for NAPLAN Online.

Further to the CPT, students have access to a public demonstration website with further practice tests available to familiarise themselves with the related functionalities within the NAPLAN Online assessment. Access this platform here below.

Please note that students will require a fully charged Macbook and headphones for the test on **Monday 23rd March (Week 8).** Students should bring their own headphones but spares will be available.

Bullying. No-Way!

At Catholic Regional College Caroline Springs we aim to create a safe and supportive school community for everyone, that enables all to have life in abundance (John 10:10) as stated in our College Motto *Live Fully Act Justly.*

You are an important part of our work to prevent bullying and to respond effectively if it happens. Stopping bullying involves everyone.

We are sending you a pocket card from Bullying. No Way! with tips on what to do if your child talks to you about bullying. Parents know their children best and know the best way to tailor communication to their needs. Adapt these tips to what works for you and your child.

If your child talks to you about bullying:

- 1. **Listen** calmly and get the full story. Your calm response is important to allow your child to tell you all about the situation. After they've told you their story, ask questions to get more details if you need: who, what, where, when. Although you may feel some strong emotions about your child's experience, try to keep calm to avoid more distress to your child.
- 2. Reassure your child they are not to blame. Many children blame themselves and this may make them feel even worse. You could say things like, 'That sounds really hard to deal with. No one should have to put up with that.' Or 'I'm so glad you told me. You should be able to feel safe at school; that's not fair at all'.
- 3. Ask your child what they want to do and what they want you to do. A critical part of your response is to avoid jumping in to solve the problem. While it is natural to want to protect your child, helping them to find their own solution is a better option. It helps them feel they have some power in the situation.
- 4. Visit www.bullyingnoway.gov.au to find some strategies. The website has tips and ideas for different bullying situations. One idea is to practise strategies at home to help your child feel more confident.
- Contact the school. Your child may be reluctant for you to do this, so discuss the idea and reassure them that the school would want to know and is able to help. Make an appointment to meet with your

- child's teacher and, if you need to, ask to talk with the principal. Contact the school immediately if you have a concern about your child's safety.
- Check in regularly with your child. Keep the
 conversation going. It can take time to resolve issues,
 so check in regularly with your child about their
 experiences and their feelings. Your ongoing support
 is important.

If you are looking for support for yourself to deal with a bullying situation, you will find ideas on the Bullying. No Way! website for parents. As well, please feel free to contact the school if you would like to discuss any aspect of our approach to preventing bullying.

Drop-off zone

In 2019 a 2-minute drop-off zone replaced the car parks on College St outside the front gate. It was received very enthusiastically by parents and after some getting used to, became very useful for easing the morning and afternoon congestion.

Hindrances to the smoothe operation of the drop-off zone are when parents:

- Stop in the first vacant spot they see and fail to move as far forward to an empty spot
- Park and 'pop into' the office for a few minutes
- Park at the front gate to watch their child enter
- Park and wait for their child after school at the end of the day
- Do u-turns in and out of the zone

Please respect the correct protocols of the 2-minute drop-off zone and it will continue to be an effective way of moving through the school zone. Council parking inspectors regularly monitor the area and significant fines have been issued to parents who do not comply. Please, help each other to avoid that situation this year.

Entering the College grounds

I would also like to remind parents that you may not enter the College grounds with your car for any pick-up or drop-off reason unless pre-arranged with the College. There are clear signs at the carpark entrance gates that request you not to enter. All students should enter and exit the school via the main entrance.

Year 9 Science

During this term in Science, the Year 9s have been exploring Chemistry. We have been looking at atoms and different bonding types that are created when they react with each other. We have learnt all about the periodic table and atomic structure, which include protons, neutrons and electrons found in each of the shells surrounding the atoms. We also explored ionic and covalent bonding of the different elements. In practical, we observed different elements and their properties. We tested these and found out the distinctive differences that both types of bonds have. I am enjoying Year 9 Science and

looking forward to what we are going to discover as the year goes on.

VCE Biology

Currently in Area of Study 1, students have covered characteristics of different types of microscopic cells, energy transformations and the excretory system. So far, there have been four major practicals:

- Agar Cell Diffusion Practical were we investigated how the surface-area-to-volume ratio affects the rate of diffusion in substrates and how this relates to the size and shape of living organisms.
- Factors affecting Permeability with Beetroots
 Practical were we investigated the permeability of the
 plasma membrane of beetroot by placing them in
 different temperatures of water.
- Osmosis in Potato cells Practical were we investigated the process of osmosis by placing 1x1x1cm potato cubes in different salt solutions and measuring the percentage loss.
- Anaerobic Respiration in Yeast Practical were we investigated how yeast will react when forced to produce energy without oxygen, while placing them in different temperatures of water.

Personally, I enjoyed learning about life at a microscopic level, how to use cool pipettes, as well as the excretory system. There have also been some challenges with VCE Biology. Students need to understand the content in detail, do lots of pre-reading and also keep up with homework from other subjects. By the end of this semester, I aim to expand my knowledge in the field of biology, of how living organisms function.

VCE Biology has been an extremely rewarding experience so far. We have currently learnt about cells (size, structure and function), the plasma membrane (various ways that substances can cross it), energy transformations and functioning systems. We have also conducted multiple practical experiments in order to consolidate our knowledge about these topics. These included in the past weeks:

• Surface Area and Volume Ratio (Agar Cell Diffusion)

- Investigating factors affecting membrane structure and permeability with beetroots
- Osmosis in Potato Cells and Red Onion Cells
- Anaerobic Respiration Yeast

Out of all the experiments we have done so far, my favourite one would have to be the 'Agar Cell Diffusion' practical where we cut pH indicator infused agar into cubes of varying sizes. These cubes were then placed into vinegar so that their rate of diffusion could be measured and the effects of SA:V (surface area-to-volume) ratio on cells could be visualised. Although there's a major shift in the amount of work we receive. I think it is a good challenge and a great way to improve on my time management. Sometimes the amount of reading we have to complete can be challenging to keep up with, but I look forward to learning new content and developing new skills which will help me with my studies in the future.

STEM Aviation

During our Year 9 STEM: Aviation classes, students were given the opportunity to construct and fly our own aircraft using pre-cut templates and small wood pieces. The planes were flown using a CTG (Centripetal Thrust Generator) and students were asked to record data about their plane's flight patterns and behaviour. We were then asked to make a modification to the plane and see how that modification would impact the plane's flight patterns. Theory work consisted of learning about the history of flight, Bernoulli's Theory of Flight and the angle of attack. Of course, this subject wouldn't be much without our two fabulous teachers Ms Nguyen and Mr Jackson, who are always there to support the students.
