Last Sunday was the day of Pentecost, seven after celebrated weeks resurrection of Jesus; the Holy Spirit was poured out upon those followers of Jesus who had gathered together in Jerusalem. In Pentecost, God pours out the Spirit upon all who put their faith in Jesus Christ and become his disciples (see Romans 8:1-11).



Celebrating Mass on the solemnity of Pentecost in St Peter's Square, Pope Francis urged the faithful to implore the gift of the Spirit that makes us artisans of concord, sowers of goodness, apostles of hope. Reflecting on the litural of the day, the Pope explained that thanks to the Holy Spirit, the disciples' worries disappeared. Rejuvenated by the Spirit, he said, their lives were changed, and he pointed out that "far from being an abstract reality: he is the Person who is most concrete and close, the one who changes our lives".

"How does he do this?" the Pope asked. "The Holy Spirit did not make things easier for them," he said. "He didn't work

spectacular miracles; he didn't take away their difficulties and their opponents. The Spirit brought into the lives of the disciples a harmony that had been lacking, his own harmony, for he is harmonv".

The Pope said that "seeing the Risen Lord is not enough, unless we welcome him into our hearts." He explained that it is the Spirit who makes Jesus live within us, raising us up from within. "That is why when Jesus appears to his disciples, he repeats the words, 'Peace be with you!" and bestows the Spirit", he said.

Peace, Pope Francis explained, is not a matter of resolving outward problems, it's about receiving the Holy Spirit. Only filled with the Spirit, he said, our hearts can be peaceful and we can achieve a harmony so profound that it can "even turn persecutions into blessings...Resolving momentary problems will not bring peace. What makes a difference is the peace of Jesus, the harmony of the Spirit", he said. Pope Francis said that at today's frenzied pace of life, harmony seems swept aside and often we look for quick fixes.

Pope Francis said that in "the age of the computer, distances are increasing: the more we use the social media, the less social we are becoming". We need the Spirit of unity, he said, to regenerate us as Church, as God's People and as a human family. He decried the temptation to "cling to our little group", to resist all contamination.

"The Holy Spirit, on the other hand, brings together those who were distant, unites those far off, brings home those who were scattered" he said. The Pope continued saying, "He looks at individuals before looking at their mistakes, at persons before their actions" and explained that the Spirit shapes the Church and the world as a place of sons and daughters, brothers and sisters. Those who live by the Spirit, he said, "bring peace where there is discord, concord where there is conflict. Those who are spiritual repay evil with good. They respond to arrogance with meekness, to malice with goodness, to shouting with silence, to gossip with prayer, to defeatism with encouragement".

Pope Francis concluded his homily with the invitation to adopt the Spirit's way of seeing things: "Then everything changes:

with the Spirit, the Church is the holy People of God, mission is the spread of joy, as others become our brothers and sisters, all loved by the same Father". Without the Spirit, he warned, "the Church becomes an organization, her mission becomes propaganda, her communion an exertion...Let us daily implore the gift of the Spirit," he said.

Pentecost and the words from Pope Francis homily, present us with an opportunity to consider how we are living each day. Are we relying on the power of God's Spirit? Are we an open channel for the Spirit's gifts? Are we attentive to the guidance of the Holy Spirit? Pentecost offers a chance to confess our failure to live by the Spirit and to ask the Lord to fill us afresh with his power. We pray that the Holy Spirit empowers us to truly live and enact our College motto of 'Live Fully Act Justly'.

On Friday 31 May, staff from all five Colleges gathered at CRC Melton for our annual Ferderation Mass. It was a very special afternoon, with Archbishop Peter Comensoli celebrating Mass, assisted by the Canonical Administrators. It was also a great opportunity to spend time with fellow staff, and reflect on the special mission that we all share.

It is apparent that the key factor which has brought into existence the five colleges which form the Federation of Catholic Regional College has been an unswerving commitment by all those involved to the call to mission given by Jesus and carried by the Church. Today this vision, symbolized in a single school crest, is entrusted to all those, staff, students and parents, who follow.

Year 9 and 10 Exams

Year 9 Examinations

The Year 9 Semester 1 examinations are being held from Friday 14 June – Wednesday 19 June

Year 9 students will be required to attend their regular classes after their examinations.

For Year 9 students, who are absent for an examination, a medical certificate is required and an opportunity will be made available for these students to complete their examinations during a re-sit session on Thursday 20 June.

Year 10 Examinations

The Year 10 Semester 1 examinations are being held from Wednesday 12 June - Thursday 20 June

Year 10 students are not required to be at school when they do not have examinations scheduled.

The College is offering a supervised Study Hall in the library for Year 10 students. Parents/carers are asked to indicate, by completing the Study Hall permission form, indicating whether their child will be attending. Students not attending Study Hall are required to be at the College on time for all of their examinations.

Supervised study sessions are available for Year 10 students in the College Library on the following days: Friday 14 June periods 1 and 2; Monday 17 June periods 1 and 2; Tuesday 18 June periods 1 and 2 and on Wednesday 19 June periods 1 and 2.

For Year 10 students who are absent for an examination, a medical certificate is required and an opportunity will be made available for students to re-sit their examinations during Periods 3-6 on Thursday 20 June.

Important Examination Information

Examinations are an important method of assessment at the College and are a learning experience in themselves. The purpose of examinations are to:

- test students' subject specific content knowledge and skills
- provide students with opportunities to maximise future examination performances
- develop subject specific examination skills

- enhance confidence in examinations
- allow teachers the opportunity to give feedback to students after the examinations.

During examination week, all students are expected to attend in full winter uniform, including their blazer, and with the correct equipment. Students should not have their mobile phone with them in the examination hall, even if the phone is clearly switched off. In order to avoid the risk of accidentally taking a phone into an examination, I would ask all students to leave mobile phones and any other electrical devices at home during the examination period.

Semester One Reports

The College continually looks to ways of improving our reporting to provide rich information about student progress. With this in mind, our Semester One reports have been designed to provide students, parents/carers a clearer and more concise picture of a student's level of attainment.


The Overall Result is designed to give students, parents/carers an indication of how they have performed in a subject throughout the semester, as a score out of 100.

This year you will note some further changes to our reports. The Semester One report now embraces the following:

- our learning area achievements appear on each subject page to display students' progress, and are denoted in both written and progression point form;
- our assessment and weighting table have been combined to show the weight of an assessment task and the student result;
- each subject is now summarised on one page.

As we are still transitioning from a previous report structure, this semester's *Learning Area Achievements* progression points (dots) may have only a solid shaded dot appearing. This will only occur if the *Strand* was not reported to in the previous 2018 Semester Two Report.

The open dot represents the last report progress; the shaded dot the current report progress; and the shaded band the expected achievement at this report.

Library

Hours of opening

The library is open

From 8:00 until 4:15 Monday - Thursday

From 8:00 until 3:40 on Fridays

Recess is for borrowing books and photocopying or printing only.

*Please note that there is an expectation that students will be productively occupied when using the library before or after school.

Loans

Students may borrow up to three books at any time for a loan period of three weeks. Books may be renewed if so desired.

Overdue books

Students are asked to be considerate of others and return items as soon as they are finished with them. If students have overdue books, they should be returned or renewed before any new items are borrowed. Students will receive regular reminders when their books are overdue via a message on SEQTA. At the end of each semester, parents will be notified of outstanding loans.

Lost/damaged books

Students should speak to a library staff member if they have damaged a book or if they think it is lost. Each incident will be assessed individually, but generally, payment will be requested for books that are lost or damaged, so that replacement copies may be purchased.

Photocopier/ printer

Students are credited with \$5 at the start of every term towards their photocopying or printing requirements. Credit amounts may be topped up if necessary by paying at reception.

Accounts Department
