Last week, we celebrated the Feast of Corpus Christi (Body and Blood of Christ). The feast celebrates the Real Presence (not a symbol) of Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. It is for this reason that Catholics venerate the Eucharist with such reverence.

On the feast of Corpus Christi, Pope Francis said that Jesus gave the Church the Eucharist for the salvation of the world.

"Every year the feast of Corpus Christi invites us to renew the wonder and joy for this wonderful gift of the Lord, which is the Eucharist," Pope Francis said.

"The Eucharist is the synthesis of the entire existence of Jesus, which was a single act of love for the Father and his brothers," he said. It is the sacrament of His Body and His Blood given for the salvation of the world."

The Solemnity of Corpus Christi, meaning the "Body of Christ" in Latin, is traditionally celebrated on the Thursday following Trinity Sunday or, in some countries including the United States and Italy, on the Sunday following that feast.

The feast provides an opportunity for the Church to focus on Christ's real presence in the Eucharist, which Pope Francis stressed should be welcomed "with gratitude, not in a passive, habitual way".

"Whenever we approach the altar to receive the Eucharist, we must truly renew our 'amen' to the Body of Christ," the Pope said, urging that this amen should come from the heart.

"It is Jesus, it is Jesus who saved me, it is Jesus who comes to give me the strength to live. It is Jesus, Jesus alive," Francis said of the Eucharist in a departure from his prepared remarks.

Pope Francis said that the processions with the Blessed Sacrament that take place around the world in celebration of the Corpus Christi feast are an "expression of the Eucharistic faith of the holy people of God".

"I too will celebrate Mass this evening in the Roman quarter of Casal Bertone, followed by a procession. I invite everyone to participate, even spiritually, through radio and television," he said.

"May Our Lady help us to follow Jesus with faith and love whom we adore in the Eucharist," Pope Francis said.

The Feast of The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus

Today (Friday) we celebrate the feast of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. We need to understand



What the word 'heart' means in the language of the bible as it refers to more than deep feelings.

The word 'heart' appears more then one thousand times in the Bible, referring to the core of one's identity. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church puts it the heart "...is (as) our hidden centre, beyond the grasp of our reason and of others; only the Spirit of God can fathom the human heart and know it fully". CCC 2563

Thus, if a person really wants to get to know someone they need to open up their hearts. This is exactly what God has done. He has opened up His heart for us by taking on human nature (John 1:14) as Jesus Christ and revealed His heart to us. It means that God wants to be known by us; He wants to enter into relationship with us; He is not distant but comes to us and invites us to get to know Him. "God thirsts that we may thirst for him" - St Augustine.

In the late 1600's Jesus gave a series of special revelations to St Margaret Mary Alacoque a nun from Burgundy, Franc. Jesus gave St Margaret Mary a vision of His heart. Here is a description of what she saw:


"The divine heart was represented to me as upon a throne of fire and flames. It shed rays on every side brighter than the sun and transparent as crystal. The wound which he received on the cross appeared visibly. A crown of thorns encircled the divine heart, and it was surmounted by a cross".

The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus is a renewal of His invitation to "follow me" (Matthew 4:19) to have a relationship with God and to stir within us a desire to respond to that love. This is why Pope Benedict XVI stated "...the devotion, which is totally orientated to the love of God who sacrificed himself for us, has an irreplaceable importance for our faith and for our life in love..." Pope Benedict XVI Letter to Fr Kolvenbach, 15 May 2006. We can only fulfil the call of our College motto, Live Fully Act Justly when we pursue the loving heart of Christ. Let us pray for God's grace to open our hearts to that of the The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus.

Reflections on Remote Learning

Dear Families,

The period of remote learning has been a challenging time for us all, but despite the major disruptions to normal activities, there will be many valuable lessons derived from this period that we as a school wish to take forward.

This has provided an opportunity to reflect on what has been learned and what matters for our school. Some of the challenges came as no surprise particularly in our first weeks of remote learning when our routine was a little unsettled. This was a time when students and teachers grappled with new ways of communicating and learning together and our parents jumped in to support as well. I have had the privilege to read so many reflective journals from our students who thank their grandparents, parents, brothers and sisters for keeping them motivated over this time.

The disruption that the pandemic has created can also been seen as an opportunity to reimagine new ways of learning and thinking. I have recently read a great position paper titled *Education Reimagined: The Future of Learning.* It raised the question; how will we choose to respond? One message that resonated with me was about using the opportunity to help

students become knowledgeable and skilled change makers through deeper learning and to reimagine a vision for an educational approach that enables all students to thrive and prepare them with skills to navigate ambiguity and change. The paper goes on to discuss an interesting way of how we could use this experience to draw from the best of traditional approaches, innovative practices, and insights from remote learning to shape new, flexible, agile hybrid learning models.

We are very excited to have our students return to onsite learning and are continually looking at ways we can, having had the experience of remote learning, do things a little differently. This presents an exciting opportunity for a curriculum that is steeped in purpose and meaning. We are looking forward to the creative planning and work ahead.

With this in mind we would like to invite you to complete an optional survey in order to help capture the learnings from the remote learning period (survey link below).

The survey is designed to be a quick capture of learnings while the experience is fresh. It is not designed to capture every aspect of schooling during the remote learning period. Your feedback will be valuable in learning from the experience and improving education outcomes for our students.

Semester 1 Reports 2020


The Semester 1 Report will be released to parents/carers on Friday 26 June. The Reports are designed to provide students, parents and carers with a clear and concise picture of a student's level of attainment throughout the semester, whilst noting the remote learning environment that occurred throughout the majority of Term 2.

The Overall Result is designed to give students, parents and carers an overall indication of their son/daughter has performed in a subject throughout the semester, as a score out of 100. Student achievement within subjects may have been impacted as a result of the remote learning period, and parents/carers are asked to be mindful of this when discussing their child's results.

The unshaded dot represents the last report progress; the shaded dot the current report progress; and the shaded band the expected achievement at this report. The unshaded dot will not appear if the Learning Area Achievement was not assessed in the previous reporting cycle.

Student Parent Teacher Interviews

As a result of COVID-19, the Student Parent Teacher Interviews (SPTI) scheduled for Tuesday 21 April were cancelled prior to the end of Term 1 to ensure adequate social distancing measures were adhered to by the College. Consequently, there has not been an opportunity for students, parents/carers and subject teachers to discuss a student's progress throughout Semester 1.

To ensure the College still provides this opportunity for discussion to be held, a SPTI will be held on Tuesday 21 July (Week 2, Term 3) from 4:00-8:00pm.

The SPTI evening will be held online via Microsoft Teams, to ensure that the College is adhering to social distancing protocols, and reducing the number of adults onsite. The evening will primarily be for SPTI requested by the subject teacher via the Semester 1 Report.

Bookings will be made available for parents/carers via PTO Online as of Monday 29 June, however to provide teachers the opportunity to adequately prepare for each interview, the online booking process will close for parent/carers at 9:00am on Friday 17 July.

Non-requested interviews will only be able to be booked by parents/carers between 9:00am Thursday 16 July and 9:00am Friday 17 July.

Parents/carers and students will be sent via email a Microsoft Teams calendar invitation for each SPTI booked, between 9:00am Friday 17 July and 3:30pm on Tuesday 21 July.

Students are expected to use their College MacBook to join each Microsoft Teams meeting and be present for the duration of all booked interviews with their parent/carer from a suitable place at home. Students are expected to be dressed appropriately for the interview as outlined in the *Microsoft Teams Student & Parent/Carer Guidelines*.

All interviews will be ten minutes duration, and parents/carers are asked to adhere to these booked times and abide by the *Parent/Carer/Guardian Code of Conduct* during SPTI. Interpreters will be made available for parents/carers as required for SPTI.

In the event that families do not have internet access at home for this, the parent/carer is asked to communicate this with the subject teacher directly, prior to 9:00am Monday 20 July, and a phone call would be made by the teacher to the parent during the scheduled interview time on Tuesday 21 July.

More information regarding how to access PTO Online and book requested interviews for your child through the PTO Online platform, will be made available to parents in the week commencing Monday 20 June.

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD)

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (the national data collection) is an annual collection that counts the number of school students with disability and the level of reasonable educational adjustment with which they are provided.

The national data collection will count students who have been identified as receiving an adjustment to address a disability under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 (the DDA). College funding in support of learners is determined by this collection and submission of data.

Mathematics Report

As we all seem to have now adjusted smoothly back into class, teachers and students are getting ready for the Semester 1 'practice' exams. It has been a long Term two, and teaching and learning has been carried out in a different way. Although

the upcoming exams are practice exams, I hope that students will still take a positive and diligent approach in their organisation and preparation to achieve the best they can in these circumstances. Students will gain experience from sitting in exam conditions and work on improving their time management skills. These practice exams will also provide students and teachers with an insight into which skills and concepts students still need to work on.

For Year 9 and 10 students especially, their Mathematics practice exam and Semester 1 overall results will later help them make an informed decision as to which pathway will be best suited for them next year.

As you know all Maths support sessions have been cancelled this term and hopefully we will start again in Term 3. Students needing additional help for the remainder of this term are encouraged to discuss their difficulties with their Maths teachers, or attend an After School Study Help session from Monday – Thursday.

Good luck to all students in their exams and as we come to yet another end of Term. I wish all the students a restful upcoming holiday break.
