Archbishop Peter A Comensoli Patrick Oration

At the recent St Patrick's Day Dinner, Archbishop Peter A Comensoli delivered the inaugural Patrick Oration. I believe in this Oration, Archbishop Peter A Comensoli clearly articulates the challenges we have and continue to face in the Catholic Church. I believe his speech offers a very positive way to move forward from the past wounds, whilst acknowledging the suffering caused.

I have included key paragraphs below which I believe are pivotal to our role as Catholic Educators....."Together, we are to be a leaven of faith, hope and love among our neighbours, in our city, for our society".

Excerpts taken from Archbishop Peter A Comensoli's inaugural Patrick Oration:

Yet I cannot deny that I also stand here tonight amid the darkest days of our proud history in this city. An earthquake has occurred, and the landscape has shifted permanently. What, until recently, offered a sure footing and a familiar vista, is now broken ground and crumbling edifices. What has been a source of pride and comfort, built by our forebears, no longer captures people's minds and hearts, and leaves our children indifferent. At this time of deep crisis and humiliation, might it not be time to let go of the past and begin anew?

So, this is the proposal I want to put to you tonight, wounded but proud; shaken but determined: that the future of the Christian faith in our city lies in letting go of the old landscape of a Catholic Melbourne, and instead re-beginning the work of Patrick, re-planting our city with the seeds of the Gospel, re-discovering a knowledge, language and pedagogy that can transform lives. It is a proposal to make the move away from the institutional centre and relocate ourselves among our local neighbourhoods of grace.

These are just a few of the many local communities spread throughout Melbourne – within the tram tracks and beyond – where we will discover saints among us. They gather to worship God on Sundays, while still enjoying their footy. They participate in small faith groups during the week as they juggle work and family. They belong to evangelical movements and organisations of charity, reaching out to the broken and struggling. They teach the Catholic faith and morals to their children because it matters.

They strive to live lives according to the way of Jesus Christ. These saints are living witnesses to hope, speaking from within the ordinary life of our city, reminding the centre (including the hierarchical centre) of a Gospel way of life that is not institutional, but local and personal. You already know them: the Newsagent owner, the local GP, the telco consultant, the bank officer, the footy coach, the shop assistant, the office worker. These hope-filled Catholics are a part of Melbourne, not separate from it, and they are you. Together, we are to be a leaven of faith, hope and love among our neighbours, in our city, for our society. But we need new Patricks to reignite us.

Performing Arts Centre and College Cafeteria

The building work on the new Performing Arts Centre and the College Cafeteria is

The College is working closely with Jude Fina Foods, a company who specialize in healthy and nutritional school catering. We are currently working on an app which will allow parents to order and pay for their child's lunch using the app. This will allow for parents to monitor what their child is ordering and to also allow payment via credit card on the app. The app should be ready for use at the beginning of Term 2. Students are also able to order their lunch in the cafeteria each morning and can also purchase food on the day without pre-ordering, using cash or EFTPOS.

NAPLAN

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) for Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 students is held in May each year. NAPLAN tests assess student knowledge and skills in Writing, Reading, Conventions of Language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and Numeracy. The results of the tests provide information for students, parents, teachers and principals which can be used to improve student achievement.

In 2018, the NAPLAN tests began transitioning from a paper based test to an online assessment (i.e., students complete the tests utilising a computer). It is anticipated that from 2020, all schools in Australia will deliver the tests online. NAPLAN Online delivers numerous benefits including for example a 'tailored test' design that adapts to correct and incorrect student responses providing a more precise understanding of student achievement;

Our school has transitioned to NAPLAN Online in 2019 with some students still completing the traditional based written test. As part of this transition, we will be administering a NAPLAN Coordinated Practice Test (CPT). The CPT is intended to enable us to confirm our technical capacity and to assist in determining the most effective way to deliver NAPLAN Online later in the school year. Testing will be conducted from **26 March – 26 April.**

Support will be arranged for students with diverse needs, if the student regularly uses similar support for classroom assessment tasks.

It is important to remember that the CPT is **not** a **formal** assessment and students will not be graded for any of the **tests**. However, student participation will assist in our school confirming that we are ready for NAPLAN Online.

Please note that students will require a fully charged Macbook and headphones for the tests.

Community Conversation Evening

On Wednesday 15 May at 7pm Catholic Regional College Caroline Springs will be holding a 'Community Conversation' evening.

The evening is specifically designed to strengthen school capacity for establishing and maintaining family-school partnerships to support improved student learning and wellbeing outcomes in our College.

What Are Community Conversations?

A conversation between people is the starting point for improved understanding. Within the community of a school, such conversations occur between all members of that community, about any areas of common interest: the family, the child, learning and growing; the ways in which the College operates; the community, its priorities and hopes.

Community Conversations provide a process that extends and develops those informal moments, and builds and changes relationships within the community. The process involves having intentional and inclusive conversations between members of the community, in which participants listen to each other, in order to understand and explore what is important to and valued by that community.

Facilitated Process

The process for holding a Community Conversation is formal and will be facilitated by the Principal and Deputy Principal Wellbeing. It aims to develop and build respectful relationships within the school community through interactions in which listening is as important as talking.

Key Characteristics

Community Conversations have five key characteristics:

- members of the community are invited to sit down together and talk
- the occasion provides a safe place to share views
- the occasion of coming together and talking is enjoyable
- participants share what is valuable and positive about the community
- the talk is facilitated to explore viewpoints and ideas.

Community Conversations place community members, family members, students and staff as equal contributors to the dialogue.

Loans

Overdue books

Lost/damaged books

Students should speak to a library staff member if they have damaged a book or if they think it is lost. Each incident will be assessed individually, but generally, payment will be requested for books that are lost or damaged, so that replacement copies may be purchased.

Photocopier/ printer

Students are credited with \$5 at the start of every term towards their photocopying or printing requirements. Credit amounts may be topped up if necessary by paying at reception.
